# March Communion Offering to Benefit Earthquake Victims

ne of the many news websites reports the news succinctly: "The figures are unfathomable."

At this writing, the deathtoll of the original earthquakes that rocked Turkey and Syria on February 6 has surpassed 47,000 between the two countries. The first, measuring 7.8 magnitude, was followed nine hours later by a 7.5 quake. We have watched in horror on the evening news throughout the month

of February as rescue teams scoured areas for signs of life. More than 4,300 aftershocks have hit the disaster zone since the initial earthquake, complicating the rescue effort.

Rare miracles seemed to occur a week to 10 days later as victims were still found alive. The scale of the devastation is still being assessed as we learn about the thousands injured and the millions homeless.

And just as the World Health

Organization's European director announced that 26 million people would need assistance, additional earthquakes followed on February 20: the first measuring 6.4 magnitude and the second measuring 5.8 only a few hours later

As with any disaster, and especially one of this vast proportion, growing concerns over health issues linked to cold weather,

## Men's Spiritual Study Starts March 7

ough and unfeeling. Sometimes, what our culture teaches us about behavior can be reflected in our own spiritual life.

Discover a deeper awareness of your relationship with God's presence through the upcoming book study "From Wild Man to Wise Man: Reflections of Male Spirituality" by Richard Rohr. Through this offering, Rev. Victor Resendiz hopes to invite men into a richer spiritual life that encourages vulnerability. The class will be offered on Tuesdays, from 5:30 to 7 p.m. (March 7 – April 18), in the Center for Spiritual Care.

"We may have been taught, as young men, not to get in touch with our feelings - our vulnerability, our fragility - these things are somewhat counter cultural," Resendiz shared. "So, what this book does is takes us into reflecting on that and giving us the 'ok' to be vulnerable and to get in touch with our feelings, but through the trusted space of the presence of God. So, when we open up, we're asking how do we do that in our prayer life as males? This book captures that. That's why I'm excited to offer it, because I really want men to lean into that part of themselves – which I don't think we've been encouraged to do so often. There's a misconception in our culture that we should only talk about surface level things ... In a way, I feel like it's a malnutrition – we need our soul to be fed so we can continue to grow, mature, and deepen our faith."

Resendiz shared that it's often a battle between tapping into the "wisdom from God" and "our own reactive system" that we all have to manage. According to typecasts, men may display anger, isolation, retaliation, sarcasm or cynicism, and repressive behavior due to cultural expectations on limiting emotions when they react. According to Resendiz, "spiritually offers a landing place where we can feel safe discerning in God's presence."

"In the middle of my career, when I was in the corporate world, I had that hard edge – that unhealthy part of male energy – but then when my daughter was born, that changed everything," Resendiz shared. "So, becoming the father of a daughter was impacting because I had to go into my tender side and my more open/vulnerable side and it was just like 'wow.' So, raising her helped me find my gentle energy and improve my listening skills – provide a safe space... all those things that a daughter requires. So, that was a pivotal point for me in finding a deeper point of spirituality."

By reading Rohr's teachings, people may be able to relate to the personal

### **Death...and New Life**

"I am not afraid that the people called Methodists should ever cease to exist either in Europe or America. But I am afraid lest they should only exist as a dead sect, having the form of religion without the power. And this undoubtedly will be the case unless they hold fast both the doctrine, spirit, and discipline with which they first set out." Rev. John Wesley –

ast week, I had two emails sitting right next to each other in my inbox. One was yet another article citing dismal statistics and prognosticating the impending death of the Church. Ironically, the other email reveled in the powerful movement of the Holy Spirit being experienced at the revival going on at Asbury University (Pastor John mentioned it in our sermon on Sunday).

And it got me to thinking about two things: 1.) Mark Twain, and 2.) John Wesley (which would make for an "interesting" dinner party, for sure). It got me to thinking about a moment in Twain's life when he read his own obituary. A newspaper in London had run with a story that he

had passed away; in actuality, it was just a relative of Twain's who'd simply been hospitalized; but it led the famed humorist to guip that the news of his demise had been greatly exaggerated.

And it got me to thinking about Wesley, too – his quote that leads this article. And in a more expansive way, those emails made me think about our story: our story as the Church Universal - a story of death and new life, a story of resurrection that's only possible after loss. That's the Gospels' promise and Church's truth!

And I thought about our story as Methodists, too... because it's an incredible story – the rise and explosive growth of the early Methodist movement. And that's exactly what it was: a movement. It was a movement from austere liturgy to Spirit-led worship,

from rote memorization to transforming ministry. It was a movement from outward appearances to the inner work of God. And it changed not just people, but an entire nation. In fact, it's been noted that the Wesleyan revivals of the 18th century were largely responsible for keeping England from the same bloodshed that wracked revolutionary France.

It was a movement that literally

changed the world because it was revolutionary a revolutionary recapturing, a revolutionary reimagining, a revolutionary rediscovering of the Gospel's power to embrace and transform women and men. And by doing so, the Gospel transformed culture.

In those early days, as Methodists were being mocked for their passion, zeal, and religious fervor (even the term "Methodist" was meant as an insult), we were tagged as "Reasonable Enthusiasts." What was meant as a taunt, though, is one of the main reasons why I chose to join this storied faith tradition, for "reasonable enthusiasts" are simply those who are, both, emotionally and intellectually engaged.

And how I pray for those days to return, for them to come BACK as we go FORTH. And I welcome you to join us in that prayer: for a fresh moving of the Holy Spirit here, for renewal and revival here, for new life here...for that excitement that only comes when we realize that we're on an adventure together: minds, bodies, souls...reasonable enthusiasts coming back to life to go forth to live!

Church volunteers are preparing to make emergency/health kits to send to people facing the war in Ukraine. Now through March 12, church and community members are encouraged to donate AAA batteries, infant liquid pain reliever, Band-Aids, and triple antibiotic ointment. These items will be paired with other necessary supplies to help the people of Ukraine. The kits will be assembled at a special Super Saturday packing opportunity, on March 25 from 9 to 11 a.m. The church is partnering with HopeHouse International to send these items overseas.

Those looking to get more involved can also write cards of encouragement. These cards will be included in the kits to offer hope and support to those facing extreme hardship. Families, Encounter Groups, and Sunday School classes are welcome to participate. Due to translation software needs, leaders ask that each card be handwritten, easily-ledgible, and written in print (not cursive). Scripture and/or words of love are encouraged. Cards can be placed in the small donation boxes or given to the receiptionist at the Admin Building front desk.

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hygiene and sanitation, and the spread of infectious diseases grow daily.

The earthquake and aftershocks were especially devastating in northwest Syria, where 4.1 million people depend on humanitarian assistance. Syrian communities, many of them women and children, are simultaneously facing an ongoing cholera outbreak and harsh winter weather, including heavy rain and snow. The humanitarian response is struggling to ramp up to meet the need among the devastation and winter weather.

Nazarene Compassionate Ministries Inc. immediately went to work, providing emergency relief aid through their churches in Syria (Nazarenes are part of the great Wesleyan family). The NCMI mission statement is "To respond to and prevent human suffering resulting from poverty and disaster." NCMI accomplishes its mission through collaborative and cooperative partnerships with churches and nonprofit organizations around the world for the support of relief and development projects designed and directed by local

leaders in over 150 countries.

The NCMI tag "Challenged by Faith to end Poverty" describes its mission to respond to the causes as well as the results of poverty as an expression of the Christian faith as understood and practiced by members of the Church of the Nazarene.

The primary focus of NCMI is working through its network of churches and support organizations to serve the poor and needy around the world. NCMI is a resource development partner that works with multiple affiliate organizations to create additional funding streams. NCMI's signature themes include child development; youth mentoring; water and sanitation health; HIV/AIDS education and support; food security; and disaster response.

White's Chapel has vetted the organization and will be a part of the NCMI's network to help these victims through the March Communion offering. The initial response to this devastating earthquake is focused on distributing food, and sheltering people whose homes were destroyed in the earthquakes. As always, 100 percent of the donations to this special communion offering will be given to NCMI to financially assist in their ongoing relief efforts.

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stories, examples or studies presented. Resendiz hopes each chapter will provide a little more awareness and allow people to gauge their own spiritual situation.

"Really, this boils down to: how do we relate to God? (which is how do we practice our faith...) the other is our prayer life (which is how do we sit in God's presence)," he said. "Those are really the two key things about spirituality

The class structure will be dynamic, allowing individuals to share their personal experiences in a safe setting as well as their insights from the reading. After studying the assigned chapters, participants will discuss the book in an open format. Resendiz will lead the group and provide examples and visuals.

"I think this is an invitation to experience our faith walk in a more authentic way – that's why I love [Rohr's] writing," Resendiz continued. "It's an open door for anyone who wants to be in this setting."

Anyone is invited to attend this upcoming study. Registration is available on the church website. Participants are encouraged to purchase the book "From Wild Man to Wise Man: Reflections of Male Spirituality" by Richard Rohr before the first meeting. The book is available for purchase in the Circuit Writers Books & Such bookstore on campus, as well as

in other various bookstores. Resendiz hopes to continue offering opportunities like this in the future to help individuals strengthen their prayer practices and spiritual life.

"There may be seasons of your life when you don't know where you're going or maybe you don't have it together... and if you have been told all along that 'you better be on top of things,' trust me, it's a hard fall," he said. "I think that's why this study is important."

# March Gardening Tips

#### PREPARE YOUR SOIL

- Remove all the weeds and indulge in a wee bit of forking to maintain a tidy and uniform surface.
- The soil is workable in the spring, so it's a good idea to add a few centimeters of compost layer or well-rotted manure over your topsoil to prepare it for the upcoming growing season.
- Cover the newly prepared soil with multiple sheets of black plastic to keep it warmer and drier in preparation for planting of summer-special seeds.

#### PRUNE

- March heralds the end of the dormant winter season. This makes it an ideal time for pruning all your trees and shrubs, all with one exception—pines.
- However, spring flowering shrubs including lilac and forsythia can be pruned now. If overgrown, these shrubs may be rejuvenated by cutting all the stems to the ground level, to stimulate nascent ones to emerge.
- Elm, birch, maple and black walnut tend to ooze sap when pruned in late February due
  to the effect of water pressure on the bottom layer of moist soil.

#### PLANT BULBS

- This is the time when early flowering bulbs like caladiums, dahlias, crocus, and hyacinth should be taken out of storage for leaving the foliage to break dormancy naturally.
- Plant tender bulbs of begonia tubers in a pot containing moist compost, covering only
  the top. These pots should be ideally kept in well-lit spots and occasionally watered
  whenever the growing medium dries out. As soon as the shoots elongate, they should
  be potted individually.
- You can also start potting up stored geraniums. The warm, sunny days help stimulate new growth and lead to fuller plants by the time summer arrives

#### **ELIMINATE GARDEN PESTS**



 Examine the crowns of your perennial plants, and you will find slugs, snails, bugs and aphid colonies cowering in the closed spaces, sheltering for the winter.

### MOVE DECIDUOUS SHRUBS TO RIGHT SPOT, PLANT SEASONAL ORNAMENTALS

- If you have a poorly placed deciduous shrub or two, now is the best time to move them
  while they are still dormant.
- When digging them up, take a wide berth all around the shrub and try taking as much of the root as possible for the faster establishment in the new location.
- Also, ensure planting the shrubs at the same level as they were in previously in the soil.
   And don't forget to water them generously afterward!
- At the end of the month, plant seasonal ornamentals including daisies, marigolds, carnations, and petunias.

#### REFRESH YOUR LAWN

- Haul out all the dead grass, moss and the clutter that has accumulated. If allowed to remain, they can quickly condense to form an impenetrable waterproof layer over the topsoil
- Talk to an expert at a local gardening center to get tips on the most cost efficient and environmentally friendly way to kill lawn weeds.

was a leading figure in the Social Gospel movement of his day. His view of faith changed during the years as he came to see the way Christianity was to be spread – not through fire-and-brimstone preaching, but through the living of a Christ-like life. He worked hard to notice the world around him and tried to bring Christ into society. He was a leader in child labor reform, especially pertaining to the improvement of working conditions, and in recognizing society's responsibility to the poor.

His beautiful prayer calls us to notice. It is a reminder we don't need to wait until we see the Grand Canyon or the grandeur of a snow-capped mountain or the beauty of the seashore to experience God. God's beauty and wonder is all around us. Some of the most powerful prayers occur during a soul walk, when we simply stroll and see, when we are

alone with God, when we let God speak to us in the breeze and through the sunshine on our skin.

When we start to notice, the jubilant song of nature will awaken our senses. We must recognize this doesn't happen all by itself. In our culture of rush, we must intentionally take quiet moments to be aware. We need to find sanctuaries of the soul in our backyards, in a courtyard at work, or on a park bench during a break. We need to train ourselves to be still and notice.

God has much to say to us; but if we are honest, we must admit that we, too, pass "heedlessly and unseeing by the thorn bush by the wayside that is aflame with the glory of God." Lent calls us to a different season, to a different way of traveling, to a different way of seeing. May we come away with God and use this time well.

#### Build a Home Project -Trinity Habitat for Humanity Saturday, April 15 & 22 | 8 a.m. to 3 p.m.

White's Chapel is working with Trinity Habitat for Humanity to fund and build a home in the Fort Worth Hillside/ Morningside community. The church needs at least 20 volunteers for each of the two build dates: Saturday, April 15 and Saturday, April 22. Volunteers must be at least 16 years old; youth under 18 may not operate power tools.

Volunteers will work, often alongside the home partner, under the direction of trained Habitat construction leaders on the home exterior. Work may include raising the walls, installing tornado fortifications, installing windows, and putting up siding. No prior experience is required. The workday is 8 a.m. to 3 p.m., but volunteers should plan to arrive by 7:45 a.m. for a few words and prayer. Safety is the number one goal, so the workday will start with a safety lesson given by the construction project manager.


