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Run & Tell

An 'Eggcellent' **Opportunity**

eople search online for "church" in the weeks leading up to Easter more than any other time of the year, with the Christmas season usually ranking second (according to Pew Research). So, these weeks present the perfect opportunity to invite new families to White's Chapel.

WC Kids are utilizing fun traditions to spread the Gospel and invite people to church through the "Run and Tell" Easter outreach effort. From March 19 to April 2, White's Chapel families will be able to pick up "Good News Eggs," jumbo plastic eggs filled with Easter goodies, in the WC Kids hallway. Then, participating families will be encouraged to bring the eggs to a neighbor or friend's house to invite them to Easter activities on campus.

The name "Run and Tell" comes from the scripture Matthew 28:7 "Go quickly, and tell his disciples that he is risen from the dead." The idea is for families to do what the Scripture says... 'run and tell' the good news that Christ has risen!

"Scripture says to 'run and tell the good news,' so we appropriately named the eggs Good News Eggs because they

Obedience

"Justice is the insurance which we have on our lives and property. Obedience is the premium with which we pay for it." - William Penn

ne of the basic tenets of Christianity is the claim that Jesus Christ is our Lord and Savior. We love the "Savior" part,

rejoicing in the grace that does for us that which we could never accomplish on our own. It's the "Lord" part that trips us up. To say that Jesus is our Lord is to say that He is our Master, and we are his servants. It means that we let go of our control and our thoughts and align our lives with His. Central to doing that is obedience to the Way of Jesus that we learn in scripture. Obedience is not a once-in-a-lifetime decision; rather,

to self it is a daily dying cross and and taking up our following. Friedrich Nietzsche wrote: "The essential thing in that there heaven and earth is... should be a long obedience in the same direction; there thereby results, and has always resulted in the long run, something which has

Emergency Health Kits Headed to Ukraine

or over a year, we have watched in horror as devastation has continued to unfold in Ukraine, and we want to do something to help. White's Chapel is partnering with HopeHouse International to provide emergency health kits to the people facing war in Ukraine.

Since Feb. 26, church and community members have been encouraged to drop off supplies needed for the emergency health kits. Requested items include AAA batteries (packages of any size), infant liquid pain reliever/acetaminophen (2 fluid ounces), Band-Aids (packages of assorted sizes), and triple antibiotic ointment (1-ounce tubes). The donations requested from the congregation will be a few of the items included in the 600 kits going to Ukraine families and will serve between five and 10 family members. Items can be dropped off in the blue carts inside the Admin Building or East Welcome Doors. The donation drive will run through Sunday, March 12. Then, the kits will be assembled on Saturday, March 25 at a special Super Saturday of Service.

"We've been working with people on the ground in Ukraine, as to the mostneeded items, and created a Super Saturday that will enable us to serve the people in the best way possible," said Outreach Assistant Dedra Moffat.

The upcoming Super Saturday event, scheduled for March 25, will allow volunteers to fill bags with essential items to help individuals afflicted by war. The kits will include the items donated by church volunteers as well as headlamps, portable reading lights, batteries, first aid supplies, over the counter medications, and various sustainable snacks. They will also contain cards of encouragement and

Vision

Vision is instinctive, something God places in our hearts.

ne of the most haunting scenes in Scripture is recorded in the last chapter of Deuteronomy when the children of Israel arrive at the Promised Land. After all the challenges of Egypt and the tribulations of the barren wilderness, the big moment had arrived. God led Moses one more time up a mountain. This time it was Mount Nebo in the Pisgah range. Moses could see the whole land unfolding like a dream, all the way to the western sea. God speaks to Moses and says, "This is the land I swore to Abraham... I have let you see it with your eyes, but you shall not cross over there." That is vision. Seeing from afar all that God has planned for us.

Vision is a popular term in leadership circles. MBA classes discuss it, corporations dissect it, but vision eludes

clinical formulations. Vision is instinctive, something God places in our hearts. Duke Ellington, the late jazz musician and composer, was once asked to provide a definition of rhythm. He said, "If you've got it, you don't need no definition, and if you ain't got it, ain't no definition gonna help." Vision is like that. It is a mental image of God's future. It sees from afar what could be. It is rooted in our understanding of God, ourselves, and our circumstances.

One of the most popular tourist destinations on earth is Walt Disney World. Walt Disney had a vision of what could happen in central Florida swampland that could bless families. It took seven years to plan and quietly acquire property, four and a half years to build. Along the way there were many scoffers and doubters of his vision. On October 1, 1971, almost five years after Walt died, Disney World had its grand opening. As they were having the dedication ceremony, someone turned to Mrs. Disney and said, "Isn't it a shame that Walt didn't live to see this?" Mrs. Disney replied, "He did see it, that's why it's here."

King Solomon wrote, "Where there is no vision, the people perish" (Proverbs 29:18).

Vision of what could be, seeing the future from afar, is what gives us hope to face the future!

bracelets printed with Scripture (featuring three powerful Psalms, translated in Ukrainian). Cards will be written by WC Kids, WC Students, Classic Adults, WC Women and Men, and various families. People are still welcome to make cards of encouragement and leave them at the Admin Building front desk. Leaders ask that each card be printed (not cursive), so they can be easily translated.

"The lights and headlamps will prove very valuable for the people experiencing rolling blackouts and loss of electricity due to the attacks Russia is making on the powerplants... just think

about not having any light for days," Moffat shared. "The over-thecounter medicines will have a significant impact by providing families with access to pain relief, allergy, and cold and flu medicines that are hard to come by. We're also adding snacksbeef jerky, granola bars and nuts – which are a sustainable source of energy. So, if they have to flee with a backpack or find themselves in a situation where food is limited, they have snacks to sustain them. The

infant liquid Tylenol is an important one, too, because there are a lot of babies who are really suffering."

"These are all items that people cannot get themselves - or they are very, very hard to get," Outreach Administrative Assistant Kim Stinson added. "This provides a way for our

The church will ship the supplies directly to the HopeHouse team in Ukraine, and from there, the co-founder of HopeHouse International, Yuri Yakovlyev, will oversee distribution. With the help and connections established by Yuri and HopeHouse International, the emergency health kits will be given to local pastors who have identified the most desperate areas. They will distribute kits to the people who most truly need the supplies.

"Because the co-founder is Ukrainian, born and raised, he knows the lay of the land," Moffat said. "He has connections to pastors; he's been working with this population for 30 plus years, so we know these [kits] are going to go to good homes – to people who actually need it. They will go to people on the front lines, to a refugee camp of women and their children who have fled from occupied areas, and and some will go to the HopeHouse families."

HopeHouse International is a nonprofit based in Franklin, Tennessee that "serves orphans by assisting Christian families in Eastern Europe with the adequate housing required to adopt orphans and raise them in their own country." According to their website, they have been serving families for more than 20 years and have international offices in

Kiev, Ukraine and Heviz, Hungary. The organization's co-founders, Deneen A. Turner & Yuri Yakovlyev, have worked hard to support children in need of a place to call home, and when war broke out in Ukraine, they knew they had to act fast to help their HopeHouse families as well as the growing number of orphans.

From the early days of the war, Yuri, Co-Founder and International Director, has been in contact with HopeHouse families throughout Ukraine. In response to the need of the Ukrainian people, HopeHouse leaders created a Ukraine: Family Emergency Fund to assist people with evacuations, relocations, home repairs, temporary housing, food/ clothing, medicine, and other ongoing needs. The fund has been utilized since February of 2022, and it continues to offer support to those in Ukraine.



HopeHouse has strengthened ministry efforts in Ukraine by supplying hundreds of Ukrainian Bibles 闻 to "HopeHouse Fathers" serving as military chaplains

church congregation to get involved and feel like they are actually physically doing something to help."

HopeHouse International

and opening a transitional housing center, Hope Ranch. The center is secure in a region bordered by five NATO countries, and it is self-sustaining.

"Hope Ranch will meet emergency, critical needs during this war, but it will also become a foundational resource for HopeHouse as we proceed with housing and orphan adoptions for the years that follow," an update from the organization's website read. "The goal of HopeHouse International is the same in wartime and in peacetime: to continue cultivating healthy future generations for Christ."

Now, HopeHouse International will continue their efforts by partnering with White's Chapel to provide much-need supplies to those affected by the war.

Tied together by Christian ministry and a heart for those who are hurting, both organizations will work together to send emergency health kits to the people of Ukraine. If you are interested in volunteering to pack kits, please sign up online for the upcoming Super Saturday, on March 25, from 9 to 11 a.m. in Evans Hall. About 75 people are needed for this event. All are welcome.



A labyrinth is an ancient symbol that relates to wholeness. It combines the imagery of the circle and spiral into a meandering but purposeful path.



contain, among other things, the Easter story and an invite to church," said Co-Director of WC Kids Hannah Robbins. "All you have to do is pick up a jumbo plastic Good News Egg from the WC Kids area and deliver it to friends or neighbors as a way to share the Good News and invite them to White's Chapel for Easter. It's a fun, easy way to share your faith and bless another kid."

Robbins shared that this effort has evolved from the "Egged" opportunity that was created in 2021 as a result of COVID-19. The focus now, though, is sharing the Good News with those outside of our church. It's a way to share

faith with those who may not regularly attend church.

"Scripture is clear that it's important to share our faith," she said. "That doesn't mean it's always easy, though! Sometimes it sounds scary or we aren't sure how to do it in a way that isn't seen as pushy or predictable.

It's important to teach our children that their faith is not something to hide or keep to themselves. And it's important to teach them that everyone is invited to God's house. It doesn't matter if you haven't been to church in a long time or ever, the door is always open. And at White's Chapel, we work hard to ensure that church isn't the stuffy, scary image that some might have in their heads. As Pastor Todd says, 'we take God seriously, but we don't take ourselves too seriously.' And there is room in our church family for everyone!"

The eggs are sure to be a hit with kids and families of all ages. Each one will be filled with various goodies, the Easter story, an activity book, and information about Easter services at White's Chapel as well as Easter Eggstravaganza. The eggs will be available for pick up on Sunday mornings or Wednesday evenings in the WC Kids hallway. If participants want to pick up Good News Eggs during the week, they can contact WC Kids.

"The goal is to reach kids and families who may not be familiar with the Easter story or who may not have a church home," shared Robbins. "The Good News Eggs are fun and appealing to kids, so it's an approachable way for kids to share their faith. We would love to see faces we've never seen before at our Easter Eggstravaganza, Holy Week activities, and Easter services... and hopefully regularly after Easter, as well!"

How It's Evolved

Because the church was unable to have the usual Easter Eggstravaganza event in 2021 due to COVID-19, leaders had to think of a creative way to celebrate Easter with families. It was then that they decided to launch "Egged," an opportunity for families to have Easter joy brought right to their door. Candy and prize-filled eggs were hidden in each family's yard, along with an Easter story activity book and a yard sign that said, "You've been EGGED by White's

Chapel." Volunteers went all over the surrounding areas 'egging' houses, and it was tons of fun for all involved. WC Care and Support and Classic Adult Fellowship ministries were also involved so home-bound seniors could be 'egged' with an Easter blessing, too!

In 2022, Easter Eggstravaganza resumed, and "Egged" continued as well. However, leaders changed the premise. Instead of WC families signing up to be 'egged,' families were encouraged to sign up to 'egg' someone else—a friend or neighbor to invite to White's Chapel. So many encouraging stories came from sharing the joy and Good News of Easter. This year, leaders wanted to keep "Egged" going as an evangelism opportunity but wanted it to look different than it had in the past. They came up with the "Run and Tell" outreach that comes from the scripture Matthew 28:7.

"We thought the jumbo plastic eggs would be eye-catching and easy for WC families to just grab one thing to give away—everything you need is inside the Good News Egg and all you have to do is set it on someone's porch or hand it to a friend at school pick up time," Robbins said.

made life worth living."

That is what it means to follow Jesus. It is a long obedience in the same direction. The root word for obedience is the Latin obaudire, which actually means, "to give ear, to hearken, to listen." To be obedient means listening to God. It means that one of the pillars of our lives will be the surrendering of time for really listening. Periods of daily quiet, attention to the meditative study of scripture, and a hungering for worship will all become hallmarks of our lives.

Lent calls us to a season of listening. We obey, not merely because we are mandated, but because that is where we find real life. Two men were driving through the back roads of a little town. They came to an overpass with a sign which read: Clearance: 11'3". They got out and measured their rig, which was 12'4" tall. "What do you think?" asked one as they climbed back into the cab. The driver looked around, then shifted the truck into gear, saying, "Not a cop in sight. Let's take a chance!" That is what happens when we turn obedience into legalism. We start looking for loopholes and wondering what we can get by with.

Jesus shows us what true obedience is. His most powerful prayer was, "Thy will be done on earth as it is in heaven." During Lent, may we discover the power of that prayer, and learn to give a long obedience in the same direction.


