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Coat Drive Oct. 1-15 **Coat Weather? Time to Get Ready!**



he last few days have finally brought relief from the overwhelmingly and miserably hot summer – one of the hottest on record. And while the cool breezes are not yet enough to pull out the jackets, we know those days are coming.

It's always hard to think about those people who have no coats when the weather dips into freezing temperatures. For these, the very cold is as dangerous

as the very hot. We worry about children; we worry about the elderly; we worry about those who are exposed to the outdoors without shelter. And that is why. each year, White's Chapel initiates a coat drive, collecting new and gently-used coats and jackets (plus hats, gloves, and scarves) for these who are in danger from the cold.

The winter clothing drive begins Sunday, Oct. 1, lasting two weeks through Sunday, Oct. 15. Coats will be distributed to the former El Buen Samaritano community in Fort Worth, Refugee Initiative families, kids at T.A. Sims Elementary and O.H. Stowe Elementary, and other folks in need.

"Last year was the first year we added the refugee families as well as O.H. Stowe Elementary to our giving," explained Sharon Nelson, who with Heather Rowley is coordinating the

event. "The school social workers know the kids at their schools that will need warm clothing. This way, the jackets will go to the children that are definitely in need."

Nelson added that leaders are also asking for donations of scarves, hats & gloves. Two of the church's specialty groups – Looms of Love and Heavenly

C.S. Lewis' Life Told in **One-Man Play**

s a beloved author, C.S. Lewis is remembered through writings, books, movies, and plays. His ultimate acceptance of the gospel led him to a life-long mission to better understand God's sovereignty and better identify his own theological beliefs. Many of his inspirational writings invite the reader to join along in the 'magical' journey that blends logic, fantasy, and Christian beliefs together in a way that is truly unique.





Dinner, **History & Methodism** By Cassidy Johnson

his October, Dr. Todd Renner will bring back the popular Methodism 101 offering, a onenight dinner and 60-minute lecture on the history, doctrine and organization of the Methodist Church. Highlighting the roots of our faith, this evening of information-sharing is sure to benefit both new and long-standing church members.

"Wrong will be right, when Aslan comes in sight. At the sound of his roar. sorrows will be no more, When he bares his teeth, winter meets its death, And when he shakes his mane, we shall have spring again." - C.S. Lewis, "The Lion, the Witch and the Wardrobe"

Clive Staples Lewis (also known as "Jack") was a respected scholar and professor of English literature, holding positions at both Oxford and Cambridge. Despite rejecting Christianity in his youth, a few of his friends helped bring him back to Christ. From then on, his beliefs heavily influenced his writings and even led him to participate in radio broadcasts about Christianity during World War II. Throughout the course of his career, he wrote more than 30 books – both fiction and nonfiction. Some of the most notable include "The Chronicles of Narnia," "The Space Trilogy," "Mere Christianity," "Miracles," and "The Screwtape Letters." Even though he passed away in 1963, he continues to be known by multiple generations for his writings and beliefs.

"C.S. Lewis was brought up a Christian but became an atheist rather early on during his time at boarding school, and he remained so throughout his time as a student at Oxford University," shared actor Philip Crowley. "But he had a number of friends who were believers, and the questions they asked him about his own beliefs challenged him. Lewis had been rigorously trained in logic by his atheist tutor, William Kirkpatrick ('The Great Knock'). But as he began

On Monday, Oct. 2, people will gather in **Evans Hall for this special presentation** with the White's Chapel co-pastor. In step with Wesleyan tradition, dinner will of course – be provided and served at 6 p.m. Renner will start the presentation at 6:30 p.m.

"We have historically offered Methodism 101 every other year for probably six or eight years," Renner shared. "I've done it four times in the past, and this will be the fifth time ... I don't think we've done one since COVID, and there are a lot of new people in the church - not just new to White's Chapel but a lot of people who are new to Methodism – and I really want them to understand this faith tradition that they are a part of now... there's a real pride that comes in 'oh wow, I didn't know that my church believes this,' and for a lot of folks, it gives them language to describe their own personal beliefs ... so that's why I think it's really important. Especially as we start to look at the new opportunities that the future holds for us, for us to start at a common center - a common Christcentered focus - we branch out and we grow from there."

This year's Methodism 101 class will be Renner's fifth time presenting the material, but it will be his first year sharing information about the Methodist Collegiate College in this type of setting. Renner will outline what it is and why it

isolation. I believe we need to battle that growing tendency.


In a world where the news and political divisions of our day can easily discourage us, we have a job to do.

to apply that logic to think about and test the ideas he was exposed to from his Christian friends, he found himself moving back from atheism to theism and eventually, to orthodox Christianity."

Crowley will play Lewis in "An Evening with C.S. Lewis." He will bring the oneman play to White's Chapel on Thursday, Sept. 28 at 6:30 p.m. in the sanctuary. It is free to the public, and registration is not required.

"The play is like a window into the life of C.S. Lewis as it takes place in his home at the Kilns, outside of Oxford," Crowley said. "If you have any sense of humor, I promise you will find yourself laughing, as Lewis shows his lighthearted side throughout the play. He recounts stories from his childhood, his school days, his time as an Oxford Don and tutor, and his relationships with J.R.R. Tolkien and others. The second act... is all about his wife, Joy, and the tremendous impact she had on his life. When she enters the stage, things get delightfully raucous."

The play was originally written by David Payne, who gave the actor permission to perform it at the church. While Crowley is a classically trained musician and professional actor, he said the one-man play initially "fell into his lap" in 2014 when a friend told him that he would be perfect for the part. In 2016, he did a few performances at his own church, boast about the play itself because I didn't write it. It was written by David Payne to whom I am indebted for giving his permission for me to perform it."

Having performed this play a few times, Crowley believes this project has allowed him to dive deeper into the mind of C.S. Lewis and better understand his writings.

"I was already familiar with C. S. Lewis before tackling this project. But as I dove deeper into the play and was privileged to perform it at more and more venues, I came to a deeper and deeper appreciation of the man and his works," he said. "Still today, I am reading his books and essays, finding new insights all the time. Though I do not consider myself an authority on Lewis, I do feel more confident to talk about him with a degree of experience, and at many presentations of the play, I have had the opportunity to have a Q and A time afterward with the audience. Those have always been especially rewarding."

Crowley stressed that the play, "An Evening with C.S. Lewis," is for anyone – Christians and non-believers alike. It is both for people who are familiar with Lewis, as they may recognize references in the play, and for people who are "meeting him" for the first time.

"I am hoping that people who come to see the play will be encouraged by the fact that there are deep thinkers and highly intelligent people out there who are believers in Christ, that sound Biblical doctrine can stand up to the scrutiny of any who challenge it," Crowley said. "I would also recommend the play to any who are going through a time of personal grief, as the second act of the play deals almost entirely with Lewis' relationship with his wife, who died of cancer. Here is Lewis at his most vulnerable. He struggles with God's sovereignty on a very deep and personal level, finally emerging with a faith that is not only intact, but strengthened... Please come see the play. God bless you. And enjoy the show!"


I pray that someone might say that of us!

Stitchers – will also be hard at work making hats and scarves for this effort.

Coats can be brand new or gently used, and coats and jackets of all sizes are needed. "We especially like newer coats for the children." said Nelson. "It makes them feel so good with new clothing. As you can imagine, kids grow quickly, and each year outgrow the jackets they had the prior year. We have children in need from at least two schools, as well as refugees and those in the El Buen community."

There will be three drop-off locations on campus: near the 'Welcome' doors in the main concourse, in the WC Kids mission corner, and in the Administration Building.

Volunteers are needed to help sort and organize the donated coats. Also, distribution of the coats will occur on various dates, requiring additional volunteers. There is a further need for volunteers who speak Spanish when distributing items to the El Buen community.

"The people in the El Buen Samaritano community in Fort Worth who received the coats were so appreciative and so

excited to get winter coats for their family members!" said Heather Rowley about their previous reaction to the Coat Drive. "For me, it was so rewarding watching the kids pick out a brand-new coat. They were so excited."

Sorting will take place on the mornings of Oct. 2, 5, 9, 12 and 16 from 9 to 10 a.m. in the concourse. Distribution dates will also vary: White's Chapel Dental Clinic (the El Buen community) will be Thursday, Oct. 19, from 4 to 6 p.m. The Refugee Initiative distribution will be Saturday, Oct. 28, from noon to 1 p.m. at Hurst UMC, following their ELL classes.

Last year, one of the high school cell groups was able to help distribute the coats to the refugees. "We had three girls helping, all sophomores at Southlake Carroll," said Rowley. "One of the girls, Sydney, was excited because she was taking French in school and could speak to the refugees about the coats they needed. She was able to make a connection."

Volunteers will also deliver jackets to the schools. Delivery dates are yet to be established. Any extras will go to other families in need.

"Last year, we collected over 1,300 coats and jackets," said Nelson. "It was amazing – our congregation was so generous! And the need seems to be even greater this year. It's a great time to clean out your closets!"

to the study of His Word," she declares on her website. Her blog contains musings about what God is teaching her on any given day. "I am passionate about knowing Christ and inspiring other women to seek Him by opening our ears to listen to His Spirit, reading His Word curiously, asking questions, exercising good hermeneutics, and clinging tightly to God through the storms of life."

She is the wife of a pastor and the mother of four children. "I am working out my faith on a daily basis," she said. "Between sports practices, doctor's appointments, church stuff, and the minutia of everyday life, I need God's Word to draw me back to the things of first importance."

With a degree in Bible Theology from Moody Bible Institute, Spoelstra is a contributor for "Girlfriends in God" an online devotional – as well as the Proverbs 31 ministries "First Five app." Additionally, she has written nine Bible studies complete with teaching videos, leader's guide, and participant workbooks.

The Monday evening women's event requires registration and a \$20 fee that includes dinner. Registration is available on the White's Chapel website.

WC Women's events are planned by the WC Women's Council, which consists of 15 women of all generations and stages of life. Each one is a vital part of the ministry through brainstorming, planning events, logistics, inviting others, praying and implementing ministry activities. exists in addition to the historical content about the Methodist movement.

"What will we learn about the MCC?

We will talk about the Methodist Collegiate's storied past for... it's fourmonth history," Renner shared. "We will share what it is, why it is, what we hope for, and some of the practical challenges that we are facing and how we are getting better because of it... As we look in the past and we see the

power and presence of God - and God's provision in the history of Christianity, Christendom, Protestantism, and the Methodist movement, and in this new way of being Methodist and taking it forward - the same God that saw us through the challenges of the past 250 years is the same God that I'm certain will see us through the next 250 years. So, it always fills me with a resolved since of hope and faith as I reconnect with my personal and theological roots."

Renner hopes others will feel hopeful as well as they gain a practical understanding of who we are as Methodists.

"This is one of my favorite classes that I get to teach," Renner shared happily. "I wish I got to do it more often but you have to wait for enough new folks to come to be interested in something like this - but I know how life-changing it was for me when I found a faith tradition like this one and if I can help anyone

that makes it all worth it."


