Scrolling Through a Winter Wonderland

ust as the world's retail sector is preparing for holiday shopping, we are also preparing for the White's Chapel Angel Tree Forest. The virtual trees became available on Sunday, Oct. 15, and they will remain online until the event concludes on Dec. 3. Physical trees will be available in the concourse Nov. 1.

This unique donation event allows people to participate in an experience that has been a long-standing tradition at White's Chapel for more than 15 years. Families and individuals are encouraged to participate by adopting an 'angel,' purchasing the items listed on their tag, and returning the items to the church to be distributed. Items listed on a typical angel tag generally range from \$25-35

per 'angel.' The number of items on each tag may vary. Participants can donate to the event, volunteer to sort gifts, or deliver donated items to people in need this holiday season.

Many of the represented groups remain the same from past years; and as always, there is a need to support children, adults, and complete families. The following list has been compiled for participants to preview the organizations represented. All are available on the virtual Angel Tree Forest link.

Adopt-A-Schools

Students and their families are represented by O.H. Stowe Elementary (BISD), Van Zandt-Guinn Elementary (FWISD), D. McRae Elementary (FWISD), and Bellaire (HEBISD) Elementary.

Presbyterian Night Shelter (PNS)

These 'angels' include families and individuals in crisis, and residents in local shelters.

JPS Foundation

This nonprofit organization is established to secure gifts and grants to support John Peter Smith Health Network and its programs, including women and infant services. 'Baby Blessings' will benefit this group.

Mercy House

This is a Christian maternity home program in Colleyville, Texas that provides housing, hope, and help for single pregnant women. 'Baby Blessings' will benefit this group.

A New Expression

ast week, Pastor Todd began a series of updates on the Methodist Collegiate Church that we'll be continuing for the next few weeks. This week, we wanted to address the actual formation of the College. When we disaffiliated last year, we were clear that we did not want to be an independent church. Instead, we dreamed of a new expression of Methodism that kept the best of our theology, mission, and connectionalism. We dreamed of beginning a movement where congregations could unite to do ministry together. As such, when we organized, we agreed on certain principles:

We agreed that there would be no trust clause. Each congregation in our connection is an independent, autonomous church that voluntarily chooses to join with us in mission and ministry.

We agreed that there would be no guaranteed appointments. Pastors are not sent to a church by a Bishop. Rather, each congregation hires its own clergy as they do all their other staff. The Dean of the College can help facilitate and assist congregations finding suitable staff, if that is desired; but the final decision is always held by the local church.

Finally, we agreed that there would be no apportionments. Each church will determine its own mission budget. We hope to work on projects together and share ideas, but participation will be completely voluntary. The MCC is about being part of a "coalition of the willing."

As churches disaffiliated, we shared this idea with others; but many

congregations have had a hard time wrapping their minds around a concept that's not yet been proven. Although the collegiate structure has been around for centuries, it's so far outside what's been the "common practice" that many are waiting for what the business world calls "proof of concept." For that reason, we decided to launch the first College six weeks ago – dreaming, praying, and working together in a beautiful, organic way that's demonstrating (and celebrating) the best of what the Wesleyan movement was about! In addition, we get a chance to show other churches how a collegiate structure works.

On September 25, the Trinity College of the Methodist Collegiate Church was born. We recognized our pastors joining from the United Methodist Church, and I was consecrated as the first Dean of a College. It was a powerful and incredibly moving service filled with possibilities for the future. At this point, our College consists of White's Chapel Methodist Church, Community of Hope Methodist in Mansfield, Good News Methodist in Cedar Park, Good News Methodist Georgetown (a new church start that is forming), and Becker Methodist Church in East Texas. In addition to these, in the near future, we are excited about building a community activities and resource center at El Buen Samaritano in East Fort Worth and restarting a worshipping community there.

As you've seen in the Herald, we have celebrated this first month in the Methodist Collegiate Church in a big way. We had an amazing night at our "An Evening with C.S. Lewis" event, at last week's Sandi Patti concert, and in a renewed energy in our worship, discipleship, and missions ministries. In fact, last week, we got to break ground on the 1,000th Habitat for Humanity house in Tarrant County! God is doing something awesome in our midst!

Just so you know, we are currently visiting with other churches who are watching how all these opportunities develop. If you have friends or other congregations that are interested, please ask them to give us a call. I love the ancient Chinese proverb, "A journey of a thousand miles begins with a single step." We are taking the first steps and looking with anticipation to where God is leading us!



Featuring the enchanting songs from the 1971 film, in addition to a host of fun new songs, Roald Dahl's Willy Wonka JR. is a 'scrumdidilyumptious' musical guaranteed to delight everyone's sweet tooth.

Pregnancy Help 4 U

This program empowers women through their pregnancy journey and beyond, providing compassionate care and support to ensure success. 'Baby Blessings' will benefit this group.

Local Nursing Homes and 'Baby Blessings'

The 'Senior Stockings' and 'Baby Blessings' are two of the most-recognized trees represented in the Angel Tree Forest. This year, the church will continue to care for those in the most venerable age groups. Senior Stockings will be given to Medicaid patients in nearby nursing homes.

PNS Patriot House /WC Soldier Ministry/ Operation Homefront

These recipients include military families and veterans.

Spokes4Hope

Spokes for Hope is a police organization, and the bikes are delivered to children in foster care and/or children in need of a bike. A bike helps with the development of a child. It promotes selfesteem and provides exercise and joy.

ACH Child and Family Services

ACH recognizes programs and provides for families in child welfare. They work to dramatically strengthen families and reduce child abuse. Several ACH programs and PNS HOSO are

included this year.

Grapevine Housing Authority/ DRC Palm Tree

'Angels' represented by these groups will help those currently living in affordable housing complexes.

Lighthouse

This organization provides for families experiencing childhood cancer. WC is providing care packages for the hospitalized children and a thoughtful gift card for their families as they are frequently from out of town.

Refugee families

These 'angels' include refugees, invited by the U.S. State Department to re-settle in the DFW area. They hail from more than 20 cultures. Many young children are included.

Dental Clinic

The families that live around the White's Chapel Dental Clinic (El Buen Samaritano) are hardworking, but struggle to make ends meet. The clinic provides gifts for adults and children. They have been a White's Chapel Ministry for many years and will represented in this effort.

White's Chapel Methodist Church Fishing

The Fishing Ministry partners with foster homes and connects with families who have children with special needs by providing experiences of nature and offering an opportunity for reflection and spiritual growth. This ministry is in need of entry level fishing equipment and donations for participating youth.

- How to access: Scan QR code below or type https://sugeni.us/ dMF9
- Some people are interested in adopting a whole family and the only way to do that is through the virtual sign up. Friends, Cell Groups, Sunday School classes, or any other group may enjoy this option.
- The virtual forest allows for 24hour selection. It is convenient and updated frequently.
- Great care is taken to provide information about the groups represented, the details about the gifts, and the instructions provided in the confirmation emails.
- Gifts for specific individuals are not duplicated so they will not be on the virtual tree and on a tree in the physical forest on campus.
- participant does not want his/
 her name displayed on the signup page, individuals can write
 "Anonymous" or an alternate
 description. However, one will
 need to indicate a valid email
 address to sign up and receive

a confirmation email to indicate

the sign up was successful.

- It is easy to contact someone if a participant has questions in the process. The contact information is at the top of each tab (before the gift listings). People can also make notes in the comment section.
- If signing up for more than one item, participants should select all that are on that tab before submitting intentions. That will go faster than selecting them one at a time, and it will reduce the number of confirmations received when selecting multiple gifts.
