One hundred percent of the monies collected today will go to this wonderful mission.

Ideas, Partnerships, Relationships

s we continue to think about the new Methodist Collegiate Church that we are in the beginning stages of bringing to life, we wanted to share a little bit about some of the amazing mission opportunities that have come our way. One of our organizing philosophies of the congregations that will join us is a strong sense of mission: locally, regionally, and globally. We dream of partnering together to make Kingdom differences in the world. Rather than apportioning an amount for missions, each church will set its own mission budgets and will oversee the implementation of their own outreach program. Once ideas are born, though, our hope is that they will be shared with other churches that might want to get involved... but the choice to participate will always be a voluntary one.

One example of this is the new partnership we have begun in Kenya. At the beginning of the summer, we were visiting with Dr. Marty Dunbar, Senior Pastor of John Wesley Methodist Church in Houston, and he shared an exciting connection his church has had for many years with a District Superintendent in Kenya. We met with the pastor by Zoom and started sharing our dreams of working together with the John Wesley and the Kenyan Methodists. Out of those conversations, Ken and Sharon Nelson traveled with the John Wesley group to experience the ministry first-hand. During the trip, they got to know Rev. Joe Kamau, and we started dreaming of ways we could get involved. We thought we might provide

an extra project: possibly a new building or providing a water well or transportation for pastors in remote, rural areas. Instead, Rev. Joe said that they needed (and had been praying for) a bus to transport children. They have a wonderful school, but there are many children who live in the streets children whose parents do not see value in education and will not take them to school. They have dreamed of being able to go and pick these children up – beginning relationships that can transform lives: minds and hearts and souls. Our newly formed Mission Board prayed about this need and voted to help. Next week, our friends in Kenya will receive their bus - a tangible answer to prayers; their prayers and ours! I cannot begin to tell you about the joy and excitement that Rev. Joe has shared with us: it's infectious.

Out of this relationship (and that's exactly what it is), these Kenyan Methodists have decided to join us in the Methodist Collegiate Church. In fact, in a few weeks, Pastor Todd, Ken Nelson, and I will travel to Nairobi to install Rev. Joe as the first Bishop of the Methodist Collegiate Church in Africa. We are also planning two congregational trips in the summer of 2024, if you would like to see and participate in the work for yourself.

This is just one example of some incredibly exciting things we are doing in missions to share the love of Jesus with the world. Notice how it started, though: a fellow church had an idea and asked us to join them. When we forged a relationship, we asked the leaders in Kenya what they needed, and then, we simply did what we could to respond to that need!

We dream of churches that will continue to partner together, to share ideas, and to work together to share Christ's love with the world! We don't want to just send our money, but to send our lives. We want to forge relationships and friendships with people that will foster peace. That's our prayer: that each church in our connection will have this passion and look for ways to share with each other! We want to be a people guided by the wisdom of Ralph Waldo Emerson: "The purpose of life is not to be happy. It is to be useful, to be honorable, to be compassionate, to have it make some difference that you have lived and lived well."

students make a public profession of faith and are individually confirmed and become full members of White's Chapel. At the end of this study, students are given the opportunity to claim the name of Christian for themselves and promise to follow God's path.

"Our beliefs are always there each time we worship, and we specifically recite them each week," said Dr. Todd Renner, White's Chapel Co-Pastor. "They're there in every prayer; they exist in every reading; they lay just beneath the surface in every song. Our every act of worship is inspired by our doctrine, by our beliefs, and by our firm resolve in the goodness, grace, and redemption of God. Too often, though, we go through the motions of worship without ever truly reflecting on the power and the history of the words we say."

Confirmation gives our students the opportunity to do intentional reflection on our acts, words, and rituals.

Confirmation is offered to students in sixth - t12th grade in the fall and the spring. For students wishing to pursue spring Confirmation, classes will begin in January. Registration will open in December for the spring session.

While the process to get involved is relatively simple, the attention to detail the sorting process requires is important. Davis knows that the work done on campus helps make delivery go smoothly, and it allows recipients to get exactly what they need.

"As always, accuracy is of primary importance to ensure gifts reach their correct destination," she said. "The bigger we grow, the more opportunities for mistakes.

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Hall on select Wednesday afternoons from 4 to 6 p.m. These dates include: Nov. 8, 15 and 29. Participants will also be able to donate their items at the base of the trees in the concourse any time during regular business hours. Gift card donations will also be accepted in addition to gifts. Angel Tree Forest leaders will be available in the concourse each Sunday morning to answer questions and talk to interested volunteers.

"I've been working on [the] Angel Tree Forest in various capacities for 13 years," said Angel Tree Forest volunteer coordinator Bridget Davis. "As the forest continues to grow - no pun intended, it has become necessary to branch out much like a family tree. No longer is it six or seven people. It's now 23 leaders and many volunteers working with specific agencies. I've been recruiting and scheduling volunteers for around six or seven years.'

Davis is hoping to recruit more people to help out during this year's donation event. While many dedicated volunteers have already been working to organize "angels" and create the many tags displayed on the trees, additional volunteers are needed to help sort and process gifts in preparation for delivery. Volunteers are also needed to help deliver and assist with the Wednesday Curbside Drop-off (available on select days in November). Sorting/processing gifts will primarily take place each week on Monday and Thursday.

"Those who want to volunteer can use the red and green 4x6 card with a QR Code on it to volunteer," Davis said. "It's titled Angel Tree Forest Volunteers 2023 and has simple directions. Look for them at the desks in the concourse. The QR code will lead you to the signup. There, you'll give your information, including your general availability. It's easy."

No fear, though. Team Leads are experienced sorters and will train you and answer your questions."

A few of the volunteer leaders recently spoke about their experience working with the Angel Tree Forest.

"Volunteering at Angel Forest is one of the highlights of the holiday season for me," Bonnie Cooper said. "The positive and energetic environment at this event, and knowing the church is helping others brings a smile to the heart."

"WC Angel Tree Forest is one of my favorite Christmas traditions," Janey Bond said. "Whether shopping for Angel tree gifts with my kids,

making new friends while setting up trees, experiencing the joy on recipients' faces, or standing in awe of the amazing team of Angel Tree volunteers; [the] WC Angel Tree Forest






The memories evoked when I glance through these pages are not really of food; they are of smiles and laughter, tears and hugs, prayers and friendship.


