Beginning. Advent.

"For outlandish creatures like us, Bethlehem is not the end of our journey but only the beginning – not home, but the place through which we must pass if ever we are to reach home at last." – Frederick Buechner


e all know that this time of year – when we sing of peace on earth and good will towards all – can be the most hectic and frustrating of all. The lines.The lists. The commotion. The obligations. The expectations. Like the infamous inn of ancient Bethlehem, we seem to live lives with little (or no) vacancy; so it's easy to get overwhelmed, to find ourselves searching for that certain "something" that can't be found in any store or bought for any price.

That is the beauty of Advent. In these days leading up to the angels' song that Christ is born, we are invited to find a calm amidst the chaos and a stillness amid the swirling schedule of December. In short, these days invite us to wonder (even as we wander). Sure, it takes a little while to decompress, and no one gets it right (whatever "right" looks like) all the time; but Advent gives us four weeks of preparation and practice, four weeks to make room in our lives for the good news that a Savior has been born unto us! It's four weeks of stumbling towards the Light, a sacred invitation to journey as the light and life of nature all around grows steadily dimmer - recognizing

that, the deeper the darkness grows, the brighter the Light shines.

It's no wonder that one of the most beloved hymns of this season is "Silent Night"...but there's an anxious story even there: one I'm sure we've all heard... but maybe need to re-hear. It starts way back in 1816, when an Austrian pastor named Joseph Mohr wrote the simple words as a poem. Two years later on Christmas Eve, the organ in Pastor Mohr's church broke just before the Christmas Mass. Determined that the Mass should not be without music, Mohr gave the poem he had written two years earlier to his organist and friend, Fanz Gruber who immediately composed the melody and arranged it for two voices: choir and guitar – just in time for the midnight service.

Bask in this simple truth: some of the most beautiful and profound gifts of this season come as the results of mistakes, of plans gone awry. These unexpected presents come wrapped not in brightly colored paper but in the people that rally around us, those who love us regardless, those who come into our chaos to remind us of the truly simple message of Christmas: that we are not alone, that hope is not dead, and that God's love continues to be born in us!

about this beautiful person teaches us a great deal. Her name is Anna, and she appears in the story of the Holy Family, Luke tells us, as Mary and Joseph bring their child Jesus to the Temple 40 days after his birth.

At Jesus' presentation, they first encounter Simeon, a man of advanced age whom God has promised to see Christ before his passing. Simeon speaks a beautiful prayer over Jesus, known as the *Nunc Dimittis*, in which he praises God, claims Jesus as the salvation and revelation to God's people, and offers a warning to Mary, foretelling Jesus' suffering and death her praise, prophetically proclaiming Christ's role as the redemption and savior of Jerusalem.

The land of her tribe, Asher, would have been coastal and fertile, containing rich pastures, wooded hills, and orchards. Asher, however, is one of the Ten Lost Tribes of Israel, whose land is part of the Northern Kingdom taken by the Assyrian conquest of 723 BCE. What once was lost is, however, through Anna found again. The lost tribe of Asher reconnects to God's overarching plan for salvation through Anna's witnessing and prophecy over the Christ child in the Temple.

There are competing ideas on how old Anna was and how long she lived after the passing of her husband, with some believing she was 84 years of age and others that she had lived 84 years after her husband had died, making her over a hundred years old. Regardless, she was of advanced age and had lived much of her life as a widow. Anna intimately knew the stinging pain of loss and had journeyed along the path of grief for some time after that loss. She transformed that pain and the lessons she learns along the journey of grief into a life of faith fervently and steadfastly focused on the worship of God. I count many in my life as "Annas," figures who have, through their faith, seen God at work, proclaimed it as such, and brought myself and others into a closer relationship with Christ. Women who have transformed broken, painful parts of their life experiences into beautiful, complete ministry done in the name of Jesus Christ to advance the kingdom of God. I pray that in this season, as we reflect on the gift of Christ that has come into the world and our lives, we keep our eyes open to those unexpected people, those "Annas" who have led us or may lead us through their faith into a closer walk with Christ. Through our faith, I also pray that we may serve as "Annas" by allowing others to recognize where God is already at work in their life, identify Christ as our savior, and connect them to the good news of his coming Kingdom of God.

Whereas, many congregations in the area produce cantatas, musical productions, shows - and musicals - many requiring tickets and reservations at cost - White's Chapel adopted the concept many years ago of providing a worship experience that was more service than performance, and one that would be a gift to the community.

"This is not a performance," said Shaunna Fuller, White's Chapel Music Co-Director. "It is a carefully-crafted one hour worship service. Every song and word, actor and dancer, has been chosen to glorify God and to bless our community and congregation!"

"We were so blessed that Lauren Luke agreed to produce this year's CWE. Lauren grew up in our church and has a vision for how to reach every heart in worship."

The program is a collaboration of all of the adult choirs, the WC Orchestra, the Praise Band, Cantaré, Youth Ensemble, soloists, dancers, and more. No auditions are necessary to participate in this annual, joy-filled expression of hope.

As Fuller always reminds us, "Our doors are always open to all who would like to participate in any capacity. We are a cast of hundreds of volunteers who are sharing gifts and talents with our church family."

Cantaré has been working very hard preparing their Christmas music for CWE since the beginning of October," said Director Teresa Hughes, in her first year of directing this White's Chapel Youth Choir. "They will open our CWE Service with a very haunting, contemporary arrangement of 'O Come, O Come Emmanuel.' This has quickly become one of their favorite pieces with the drums and amazing orchestration."

Additionally, Cantaré will be featured in an Italian song "Nella Fantasia," which

"A very fitting text to be singing about in light of our current world situation," added Hughes.

"The song is a beautiful arrangement for a tenor, baritone and choir as well as a wonderful opportunity to sing with Arnold Rawls, who has a diverse background in opera. This will definitely be a highlight for our Cantaré Youth Choir and certainly for our congregation as well."

Fuller added that the service will feature many special moments. She said that some of her favorites include "14-yearold Michelle Nieto, who sparkles on the piano; DeeDee Elliot will be singing to her new baby, Raia, as baby Jesus; Doug Terry and Cindy Sledge bring back 'One King'. Jacob Serrano, is introduced - a new soloist who is a worship leader for WC Students; Bruce Wermuth sings everyone's favorite 'Drummer Boy'; Grace Zeller introduces a new 'Noel' and Ken Nelson closes our worship with energy and enthusiasm."

"Pastor John's mom always encouraged us to include more familiar carols and hymns so our audience could connect easily with our music," Fuller said. "To that end, we are introducing, 'O Come, O Come Emmanuel,' Come Thou Long Expected Jesus,' 'O Little Town of Bethlehem,' and 'Joy to the World.' Though the melodies and tests are familiar, the arrangements are fresh and exciting."

"Our desire is for people to truly worship at the White's Chapel CWE, 'There Is A King," said Hughes. "Through music, narration, drama, visuals and dance we tell the ever-familiar Christmas story in a fresh and creative way - that truly invites people to worship."

As Max Lucado tells us through his wonderful writings, "God loves us and God is with us. We are ever reminded once again: "The child in the cradle became the King on the cross. And because he did, there are no marks on my record. Just grace." on the cross. Then, we find the elderly prophetess, Anna, who was a fixture of the Temple, fasting and praying, awaiting the presence of Jesus. Here is how the author of the Gospel of Luke describes Anna and her interaction with the Holy Family:

"There was also a

prophet, Anna, the daughter of Phanuel, of the tribe of Asher. She was of a great age, having lived with her husband seven years after her marriage, then as a widow to the age of eighty-four. She never left the Temple but worshiped there with fasting and prayer night and day. At that moment, she came and began to praise God and to speak about the child to all who were looking for the redemption of Jerusalem." - Luke 2:36-38

We know little about Anna, and even less about the specifics of her prophecy over Jesus, but what we know reveals much about her. Anna is the daughter of Phanuel, a member of the tribe of Asher, a prophetess of advanced age who has spent a significant portion of her life as a widow. She is a devout Asherite Hebrew, devotedly spending her time fasting and praying in the Temple.

Her father's name, Phanuel or Penuel, translates into "Face of God." As she sees the face of the Christ child in the Temple, she again looks upon the Face of God. As she had most assuredly seen in the face of her father who, through his faith, inspired her own, she sees again God's recognizable features. This prophetess is at once inspired to offer


Kenya Adult Mission Trip June 13-21 (Team 1) June 20-28 (Team 2) | Trinity Methodist Ministries, Kenya, Africa

Come join us on our first mission trip to Kenya where we'll visit, work and learn about the ministries of the Trinity Methodist church in Gilgil, Kenya. We have two groups going with 15 people on each team. The Trinity Methodist Church is a district of 18 churches around the area of Gilgil. They have a Safe House for women in need, a full-time Medical Clinic, two high schools and they are about to open a primary school. We'll be helping wherever we are needed: painting, construction, helping with medical ministry and playing with the children. Total trip cost is \$2,500 (includes all transportation, lodging, meals and a safari excursion). A non-refundable deposit of \$500 is required to complete registration and final payment is due in February. Registration is available now on the church website. Besides a current passport, a Kenya E-Visa will be required at a cost of \$55. Medical requirements include: Yellow Fever vaccination (\$100-\$300), Malaria prevention medicine (\$25) and COVID vaccines. 
Super Saturday: Rise Against Hunger Saturday, Jan. 27 | 9 to 11 a.m. Evans Hall

The dry, packaged food, supplied by Rise Against Hunger, will provide a nutritious meal when recipients mix it with water. There will be two volunteer opportunities: (1) help unload supplies from the truck and set up packaging stations from 8 to 9 a.m. and/or (2) actively participate in the fight to stop hunger by measuring and packaging meals for those in need from 9 to 11 a.m. Approximately 30,000 meals will be packaged and shipped globally!
