Compassionate Listening Training

t's something of a lost art—a skill that many in our culture today may not possess. The time of listening and communicating around a family table, without cell phones, TVs, noise, or distractions, is now rare. Chandler's Hope, an addiction and recovery ministry at White's Chapel, hopes to recapture some of these important listening tools by offering a Compassionate Listening Training on Saturday, June 24 to both ministry leaders and people within the community.

"Compassionate listening somewhat goes beyond just listening," said Rev. Victor Resendiz, director of Chandler's Hope. "It's the gift of presence, right? Sometimes, we misinterpret our listening for wanting to give advice or counsel or uninvited points of view, but compassionate listening is genuinely just being there and being present... so the characteristics of compassionate

The Perfect Summer Podcast

e have the perfect thing for your next road trip or long flight – a funny, family-friendly podcast that will make you actually enjoy traveling to your summer destination. "Next Question," a podcast hosted by Rev. Sam Robbins, has run for about a year but the show will soon include exciting new episodes for listeners to enjoy.

Covering a wide range of topics, the light-hearted podcast focuses on life's many questions—both big and small. Questions are submitted by church and community members and then, Robbins writes each one on a piece of paper and puts them in a bowl to draw at random during the show.

"If this is your first time listening and you're new to Next Question, here is kind of how it works—we have a bowl in front of us right now full of little slips of paper and on those slips of paper are questions," Robbins said in the most recent episode. "Many of these are submitted by you, the congregation..."

Robbins and his featured guest(s), answer the questions and discuss the topics among themselves. Guests typically do not know the questions ahead of time, which makes their answers unique, thoughtful, and extremely interesting as they answer them 'on the spot.' So far, the podcast has included pastors and White's Chapel staff members. Questions featured in past episodes have included: What Netflix show do you see God in? Is Creed a good band? What is your favorite Bible story? Should Pluto still be considered a planet? What are some habits we can practice in building generosity? Do you know what a sword drill is? Who would you like to play you in a movie? What is your dream road trip? What is one of the funniest things or worst mistakes that has happened to you during a service? Which Biblical character do you most identify with? And many more...

outline during this presentation are presence, empathy, composure, and patience—and I would even add, along with patience, tolerance."

Resendiz and Chandler's Hope volunteer Shannon Luce will facilitate the upcoming workshop by modifying some of the training tools provided by Stephen Ministries. The information will be geared toward Chandler's Hope leaders—or Chandler's Friends—as they walk alongside those facing addiction or recovery, but the training will also help anyone wanting to learn how to be a better and more empathetic listener.

Luce's knowledge in leadership development and previous experience on the American Airlines Global Engagement Team will greatly benefit attendees. She will also use many tools from her current job, facilitating mental health courses for the City of Fort Worth, to help participants practice listening skills.


"We are often not encouraged to listen; we're encouraged to absorb media, but we are not encouraged to listen—and it's a skill," she shared. "It's very difficult for us to allow someone to speak, and it's very difficult for us to then have silence. Just allowing silence in a conversation... we want to fill it with something. You

ollowing up from Pastor John's column last issue, and as graduations take place for many of our own kids, I have been thinking about some of the advice I received from loved ones when I walked across that stage over a quarter-century ago (wow, it hurt to put it like that).

I remember all their words about following our passion. I remember all of their advice about staying strong in the faith. I remember all of their wisdom about associating with the right kind of friends-with people that would strengthen me and challenge me and hone me into becoming the person that God wanted me to be. I remember their words, and I can still feel their love... but I can't remember anyone telling me to simply be, to simply take each day as the sacred gift that it is. For all of their care, I don't recall anyone ever telling me to simply enjoy the journey; their words only pointed to some glowing destination in the future, to some ending of a story that I was still writing... and I wonder how many of us are still penning the chapters

of our lives (because, if the truth be told, we never truly graduate from life's eternal school).

Regardless of our age, regardless if we will don a cap and gown this season or if we still look back with wistful memories of our own graduation decades ago, I think that each of us still sit with a blank page before us. Each new day is the opportunity to author some new detail, some new beginning that leads to a different, better conclusion. We must realize and own that maybe the choices that we've made haven't been the best ones; we must accept that the plotlines that some of us have chosen to go down haven't led to the outcomes we so hoped and so prayed that they would.

the word out to their community, and we were shocked when we started the program at 5:15 p.m. and were finished by 6 p.m. because it was a huge success! So, next month we will provide food for 200 families and grow from there."

Lisa Barham mentioned, "the critical need for food donations also increased after several food stamp benefits made available through the Supplemental Nutrition Assistance Program during the COVID-19 pandemic expired in March. We are seeing this at our O.H. Stowe Elementary School as well as with GRACE. Some of these families were getting \$200-\$600 per month. Moms and dads receiving the food we are providing are telling us, without that extra money, they can't feed their families. This program is

essential and is a blessing to hundreds of people. Everyone at White's Chapel can be proud of this program, our church is making a difference and helping people that simply need to see and feel God's Love and Grace."

The interactive workshop will be held on Saturday, June 24, from 9:30 a.m. to 1:30 p.m. During the four-hour training, many skills such as paying attention, validating, asking questions, and reflecting will be discussed and rehearsed. Participants will have the opportunity to practice these things in breakout sessions and take notes as the group follows a provided handout. People only need to have something to write with and a willingness to learn to attend. Lunch and pastries will be provided, so registration is needed to account for supplies. Participants can register on the church website. Registration is not limited to those facing circumstances of addiction; anyone can attend to learn better listening skills. "Whether or not you're coming because you are dealing with addiction in your family, you're dealing with a challenging relationship in your family or friendship, or a challenging business relationship, I think this is absolutely going to support you and it's going to support you building your skillsets," Luce said. "My hope is just for folks to be aware, first of all, that their presence is important in their loved one's life... and hopefully these skills will help them with that presence," Resendiz said. "And also, for those who are not aware of Chandler's Hope, that this training helps them understand and know what we are doing."

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reality is homes don't get repaired in 30 minutes and neither do relationships, and yet our thought process is 'in five easy steps'... and that's what we've been trained to think... I think it's very, very hard in our society. I think there are so many distractions and that is what prevents us from using our skills and perfecting our skills-and it is a skill like any other skill. You simply need to use it, and you need to reinforce it, and you need to practice it."

Resendiz believes this class will offer encouragement to people supporting loved ones facing addiction, but he also knows there is no 'easy fix.' He understands that everyone is unique and their situation is specific to them. Even so, he hopes people will be able to find the balance between providing the space and support a loved one needs while also drawing healthy boundaries of self-preservation. While it may start with compassionate listening, he believes "it's also about allowing the loved one to find their own resilience, their own inner strength, and in some cases, their own desperation so they can get the help they need."

This workshop will help equip leaders and volunteers of Chandler's Hope with better listening skills to help those facing difficult circumstances. In situations of addiction, many may listen with a sense of fear or with an anticipation to respond. Both facilitators believe that providing a more empathetic space may benefit both people and preserve the relationship.

"All of us involved in Chandler's Hope, in one way, have been touched by addiction—whether that is as an individual who is an addict themself, whether they are supporting a family member who's gone through that, a friend, etc." Luce said, speaking about Chandler's Hope leaders and volunteers. "So, we have all been touched by addiction, so we are coming at it from our own space."



Chandler's Hope

Chandler's Hope is an addiction and recovery ministry at White's Chapel that offers resources for people who are struggling and in need of hope. Additional Chandler's Hope events and workshops will be offered in the fall. A book study, a workshop on parenting and communication with teenagers, and a forum on the fentanyl epidemic are currently in the works. Dates will be released in coming months. For more



The questions, while entertaining to listen to and helpful to learn from, also present unique topics to discuss among family members or friends.

"My hope is that people get to see a different side of our pastors and staff," Robbins said. "Many of the questions we answer are deep and theological in nature, but many are fun and lighthearted. I think it's a really fun listen. One minute we might be discussing the nature of evil and the next we're debating what flavor of pie is best."

The most recent episode included WC Co-Pastors Drs. John McKellar and Todd Renner. It featured personal stories, memories, opinions on food, a little theology, and lots of laughs.

During the episode, the group read a question submitted by a 4-year-old boy named Jackson. He asked, "Why does Jesus love us?" The group praised the little one for his thoughtfulness. Another person asked "What do you think we look like in Heaven? What age are you? Do you get to pick an age?" The two said, while they are not certain of these things, they hope and believe they will recognize their loved ones. "We do our best to answer the questions, but sometimes we just contemplate," Robbins said. "Many of the questions we get are big and complex and so often we find ourselves just thinking through them together. And I think that's a big part of the heart of this thing—we don't have all the answers but we love talking through the questions."

he Mix Kitchen is a commercial kitchen operated by the Missional Wisdom Foundation in cooperation with White Rock United Methodist Church in Dallas. Recently, the Mix Kitchen leaders have followed a calling by the Holy Spirit to use the kitchen to support

the feeding ministries for homeless and hungry people in the DFW Metroplex. The Mix Kitchen has partnered with a wonderful nonprofit homeless ministry to "repurpose" donated food from grocery stores and restaurants. Food donations are turned into delicious meals for our hungry neighbors on the street by an experienced chef. In the month of September, between leftover catering food and donations, the kitchen prepared approximately 500–600 meals. Donations support purchasing food items to supplement the food donations and help fund our chef in this work.

The chef and leader of The Mix Kitchen, Ms. Rhonda Sweet, is an experienced chef, business manager and teacher. She has shown an affinity for to children and/or proving jobs to marginalized people. Rhonda is an experienced chef, a seasoned manager and a strong Christian. She runs a successful catering company, building on her experience as a regional manager for Boston Market. Rhonda was a contestant in Season Two of Master Chef, gaining recognition as an excellent chef on a national

platform. She is an outstanding coach and teacher, and as a woman of color herself, she relates to the unique issues a woman of color encounters in starting a business. Rhonda's efforts are supported by White's Chapel members Dr. Larry Duggins and Denise Crane, who are heavily involved in the daily operation of the MWF, and by WC Co-pastor Dr. Todd Renner, who serves on the MWF Board.

The feeding ministry work of the Mix Kitchen under the leadership of a Christian woman in a church environment invites meaningful spiritual growth to all those it encounters.
